

Palm Sunday of the Passion

From the Rector

Dear Ones,

We have made it to Holy Week! I can't decide if this Lent passed quickly or slowly. In some ways it feels like ages ago that we held our vestry meeting on the last Sunday of Epiphany. In other ways, I feel like I blinked and found myself standing on the cusp of this most solemn and holy time. When I was growing up, I never attended any Holy Week services. In my hometown, spring break always coincided with Holy Week, so my family would spend our time at the beach. It wasn't until I was a teenager that I finally experienced these amazing liturgies. Once I did, though, I couldn't imagine ever not attending!

I love Holy Week because in these services, we get to enter into the drama of the Last Supper, the crucifixion, the story of God's saving history with God's people, and the celebration of the resurrection. We don't just hear the lessons read and have a sermon about them. We put ourselves in that Upper Room, and at the foot of the cross, and in the darkness of the wait for salvation. And these experiences are extraordinarily concrete and sensory—the washing of feet, the tasting of bread and wine, the visual of the altar being stripped, the feel of the hard wood of the cross, the sound of exquisite music . . . It is a solemn time, but it is a feast for the senses! In all that we do during Holy Week, we remember these momentous events of the Paschal Mystery not simply in the sense of recalling that they took place, millennia ago, but of "re-membering" them—making them a reality for us, in our own day.

If you have never been to church between Palm Sunday and Easter, I urge you to make this the year. Join us on Maundy Thursday as we wash one another's feet and celebrate the institution of Holy Communion. Come on Good Friday as the choir offers a beautiful sung setting of the Passion, and then, come forward to the large wooden cross in prayer and meditation. Come to the Easter Vigil—join us in the Memorial Garden, in the dark by the New Fire, as we prepare to process into the church carrying the Light of Christ with us. Listen with us, to stories of God's saving deeds on behalf of humanity. Renew your baptismal vows with us. If you have bells at your house, bring them with you, and ring them joyfully during the Gloria in Excelsis. And share with us in the first Holy Eucharist of Easter. This will be my first holiday with you as your rector, and I am so excited for us to walk this path together. Whether you join us in person or online, I pray that this Holy Week will be a time in which you're able to connect deeply with the story of our faith, and that when Easter comes, you will find your hearts and spirits renewed in love and hope and joy.

Reflections by the Rev. Canon Herb O'Driscoll

THE FIRST READING Isaiah 50:4-9a

We are beginning the holiest time in the cycle of the Christian year. We step out on a path that leads us through the most intense days in our relationship with Jesus, a path that takes us through many locations. In those settings we have sometimes searing encounters with many people, most of whom are quite unaware that they have become caught up in a great drama that has implications for all of humanity and for all subsequent human history.

We simply don't know of whom Isaiah is writing. It could have been his own difficult experience trying to reach his own people while they are in exile. We do know that this passage is read on this Sunday to point to the cost of Jesus' own ministry. Whoever is being referred to, he is being met with resentment and even violent rejection. In spite of everything, this unknown servant of God simply refuses to give up. "morning by morning God wakens my ear to listen". Rejection and violence seem only to make him stronger. All of this also points us to the stresses and suffering of Jesus' ministry.

What makes it possible for this unknown person to persevere in spite of everything? He tells us again and again. It is God's unfailing grace...verses 4,5,7,9.

THE PSALM 31:9-16

Much of life is a struggle. Sometimes we are resolute and confident as we face this or that. In this we are like the unknown messenger in the first reading. But there are times when life overcomes us and can seem hopeless. The Psalmist says "I am consumed with sorrow…my life is wasted with grief …my strength fails.". At some point this hopelessness becomes fear. " the crowd put their heads together against me". Again, all of this Jesus will feel approaching the cross.

THE SECOND READING Philippians 2:5-11

"Let this mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus". At first it sounds like a reasonable, even manageable, demand from Paul. Only when we look again at the ministry of Jesus and it's terrible cost do we realize the terrifying standard we are being set. "He emptied himself. He humbled himself. He became obedient to the point of death".

But it is the depth of sacrifice in Jesus' obedience that leads to the glory Jesus attained, and that makes him the Christ for us who worship Him. The thing above all else to learn from this beautiful - and also terrible passage is that in the domain of the kingdom of God, power emerges from humility.

THE HOLY GOSPEL Luke 22: 14 to 23:56

This passage is the core narrative of our Christian faith. It cannot possibly be taken in by one reading or one listening. I suggest our best way to come to grips with its vivid and powerful narrative is to come to it as a film with its different locations and scenes and what they can mean for us. There are seven locations.

The Upper Room - the Place of Community. The Garden of Gethsemane - the Place of Vulnerability. The High Priest's House - the Place of Confrontation. Pilate's Hall - the Place of the Powers. Herod's townhouse - the Place of Decadence. The Via Dolorosa - the Place of Suffering and Loneliness. The hill called Calvary - the Place of Dying.

Think about these places. What did they mean for Jesus? Then think of our own life.

Where have I felt the grace of community? Where have I felt overcome by a sense of my vulnerability? Where was I forced to be confrontative or to face it? When did I feel in the grip of forces that made me feel helpless? When or where did I realize I was in a sinful situation? When have I experienced loneliness or suffering?

I think it would be possible to do an effective homily by asking the congregation each of these questions in turn. Asking the first question, have everyone reflect silently about their own experience, then asking the next question. And so on.
