

### From the Rector

Now that Joe is working in his own parish on Sunday mornings, I have had our three "big kids" at church with me most Sundays. They are finally mature enough to mind themselves during church (most of the time), so it works out pretty well. They can be noisy, and I'm sure you've probably noticed me giving them "the mom look" from the presider's chair once in a while, but overall I am really happy that they're able to continue to come to church, even without a parent to accompany them.

St. John's is such an amazingly patient and welcoming community for children! Every place claims to be welcoming, and I think most places truly believe that they are. But often churches without many children don't know how to make families comfortable. Joe and I usually visit other Anglican parishes when we travel, and I have seen a wide variety of well-intentioned but overzealous responses to our children's presence. The most over-the-top was about six years ago, when we visited a church in Lake Tahoe at which parishioners kept offering to take George and Jeannie for a walk so that Joe and I could enjoy coffee hour. Their hearts were absolutely in the right place, but they didn't understand that having strangers take our children away might make us nervous.

After that visit, I started asking myself, "What is it that parents are really looking for, to feel supported at church?" And over time, I came to realize that at least for me, personally, it's acceptance. I don't necessarily need anyone to step in and help, although sometimes when people do that, it's wonderful and much appreciated. But parenting in spaces that are supposed to be quiet, dignified, or solemn is challenging. There is so much effort that goes into trying to preserve the atmosphere without making our children miserable. There is such a feeling of being a spectacle. When a parish can welcome parents warmly without being overbearing, and can accept the inevitable noise and mess without much to-do, it makes our participation—and that of our children—much more comfortable and natural.

Just so that you hear it and believe it: my children absolutely love it here. They love the fact that there's a children's corner in the front of the church. They love

to play with their friends during church, and they love that no one stops them from playing (even if I do give them the side eye when they're too rowdy). They love spending time with the teenagers who sit there and help. They love doing the crafts Mother Liz picks out for them. After only a few months, they feel at home here.

And in case you're wondering what long term impact that makes, allow me to share a story with you from a couple of weeks ago. Chatham was sitting in the children's area during the 8:00 service. When it was time for me to set the table, she tiptoed up to the altar to ask me for water. I told her I couldn't get her any, but she could help me set the table. She was so excited! She brought me things and I set up for communion, and I told her she could stay with me as long as she looked prayerful. She agreed happily. Then, when I put my arms up (into what we call orans position) for the Eucharistic prayer, Chatham put her arms up, too. It was so sweet I almost cried.

It may seem like children aren't paying attention while they're coloring or playing, but I promise you, they are. They are absorbing parts of the liturgy, and even more than that they are absorbing the sense of importance of being in this place and offering our praise to God. They are learning, right down to their core value system, that coming to church matters to their parents, and to all these other adults and children and teenagers. And they are learning that they matter to this community, enough that we want them with us—noise, messes, and all.

Thank you for welcoming my family, and all families. It is such an important ministry, and it is bearing fruit already!
