

Dear Abbey

Dear Abbey,

I noticed on Sunday that we sang different music in some parts of the service. Was it somehow related to the queen's death, or was there some other special day that I missed? Or did we decide to make a long-term change? If so, why?

Dear Treble Maker,

We did have many musical elements last Sunday that were chosen specifically to honour Her Late Majesty, but the changes to our regular service music were a separate decision. While our hymns change weekly because they are generally related to the prescribed Scripture readings for the day, the service music is usually chosen seasonally so that we can build familiarity with it over time.

In a typical service, following the Collect for Purity ("Almighty God, to you all hearts are open . . ."), we sing a song of praise. In Easter season and ordinary time, this is usually a *Gloria* (some version of the canticle "Glory to God in the highest"). During Lent, we use a *Kyrie* ("Lord have mercy"), instead. And during Advent, many parishes use the *Trisagion* ("Holy God, Holy and Mighty, Holy Immortal One, have mercy on us").

At Holy Communion, after the Celebrant chants or says the preface, we sing the *Sanctus* ("Holy, Holy, Holy"). And at the Breaking of the Bread, we often sing a fraction anthem, which can be a variety of texts, but the *Agnus Dei* ("Lamb of God") is traditional.

Collectively, these elements comprise what we call the "service music." Many composers throughout the centuries have produced complete mass settings. In those cases, the music for the *Gloria/Kyrie/Trisagion*, *Sanctus*, and *Agnus Dei* complement one another, as they were written as part of a single work. Generally speaking, it is preferable to select a single mass setting to use for all elements of the worship service. Sometimes, however, one piece in the mass setting is either too lengthy, too difficult for the congregation to sing, or not

available in a good English translation; other times, a composer might produce individual elements of the service without creating a complete mass setting. In those cases, we might combine musical selections from more than one source.

This fall, we're using Franz Schubert's *Deutsche Messe* for our *Sanctus* and *Agnus Dei*. In Germany and Austria as early as the late middle ages, there is evidence of some sung portions of the mass being offered in the vernacular. By the Council of Trent, the practice was well-established. Schubert composed his work in 1826, and it has remained popular ever since. The setting in *Common Praise* was arranged by renowned twentieth century composer Richard Proulx.

For the Song of Praise, we're using the early Lutheran hymn Allein Gott in der Höh sei ehr, attributed to Nikolaus Decius. The Reformation brought with it mass in the vernacular, and a sung mass therefore required service music in German. Allein Gott is believed to have been written in 1523 as a paraphrase of the Gloria, making it one of the earliest Reformation hymns.


