

Stewardship Ingathering -- this Sunday!

In the season following Harvest Thanksgiving, our parish has been encouraged to reflect on the many blessings of our lives. We have been challenged in sermons to give thanks in all circumstances, recalling that, somewhat counterintuitively, it is not happy people who are grateful, but it is grateful people who are happy. Deacon Karin also reminded us that what we are really after in life is not happiness, but a kind of joy which transcends our circumstances. Gratitude and joy go hand in hand.

At the Eucharist this month, before the appointed prayer over the gifts, we have prayed the verse from Chronicles, "All things come of thee, O Lord, and of thine own have we given thee." We have reminded ourselves that everything we have belongs to God, and when we make an offering out of gratitude, we are giving to God what already belongs to God in the first place.

Yet our offerings also represent ourselves. Our time, talent, and financial resources don't come easily to us. We work hard for them. And the decisions we make about how to use them—they are personal and meaningful. Each choice to give of ourselves toward God's mission through the church is also a choice about where that time, or effort, or money is not being directed. There are so many needs in the world. There are so many needs in our own lives and the lives of our loved ones. A gift, even out of what already belongs to God, still represents a sacrifice on our part. And that is a holy thing.

One of my favourite parts of the *Book of Common Prayer* service of Holy Communion is the prayer, "And here we offer and present unto thee, O Lord, ourselves, our souls and bodies, to be a reasonable, holy, and living sacrifice unto thee." When we make an offering at the Eucharist, it is not simply a matter of dropping an envelope in a plate. We are offering the fruits of our labour, and indeed our very lives, to the God who has so richly blessed us.

This Sunday, I invite you to bring your pledge cards to church for our ingathering. At the offertory, you are invited to come forward and place your cards in the basket, to be consecrated on the altar before the Eucharist. When we do so, let us remember that we are blessing more than pieces of cardstock, and more, even, than money. We are offering our very lives in service to God.

If you have not received a pledge card yet, they will be available at church on Sunday. If you worship from home and would like to have a pledge card mailed to you, you may contact the parish office and we would be happy to send one to you.

Let us prayerfully consider the ways God has blessed us in this life, and how we are being called to contribute toward the church's ministry in 2023, that we might be a blessing to this parish, to our community, and the world.

Dear Abbey,

I was wondering why we use different creeds at different services? Is there a pattern to when we do which ones?

Dear Wondering,

Ah, creeds. Some people love them. Some people find them challenging. And I can see how it may be a bit confusing trying to determine when we use each one, and why.

Creeds are basic statements of belief about God. Anglicans use two creeds in worship—the Apostles' Creed and the Nicene Creed. (There is also the Athanasian Creed, which we affirm but don't say in worship. It describes the nature of the incarnation and our belief in the Trinity. But that's a discussion for another day.)

The Apostles' Creed is the ancient creed of Baptism; it is used in the daily office (morning and evening prayer) to recall our Baptismal Covenant. The Nicene Creed, on the other hand, is the creed of the universal church. Its roots are in the fourth century, as a means of defining correct belief in a time of theological controversy.

As for when to use which creed at the Eucharist, there's a lot of flexibility. The Nicene Creed is permissible at any Sunday Eucharist, but it is only strongly encouraged on major feasts. The rest of the time, we are free to use the Apostles' Creed instead. At St. John's, Shaughnessy, our custom is to focus on the faith of our baptism most weeks. In fact, this coming Sunday when we observe All Saints Day, we'll actually be doing the Renewal of the Baptismal Covenant. Instead of reciting the creed as usual, the Celebrant will ask questions: "Do you believe in God the Father?" "Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?" "Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?" We will respond to each question with a portion of the creed, just like we would at a baptism. And we will continue by renewing the promises we have made to live as faithful disciples of Jesus Christ. Afterward, in place of the Prayers of the People, we'll pray the same prayers for ourselves that we pray for the candidates when a baptism takes place. They are short, but meaningful—and all the more lovely because we will chant them with the choir.

So, when will we use the Nicene Creed again? Probably not until Christmas. But if you find yourself missing it, you can join us any Sunday at eight o'clock, when we worship from the *Book of Common Prayer* and recite the Nicene Creed weekly.


