

### **Diaconal Reflections: Christ the King**

#### Jeremiah 23:1-6

In the pastoral culture of ancient Israel, the imagery of the shepherd conveyed notions of authority and responsibility. Jeremiah spoke out against their abuse by the misguided kings of Israel and Judah. But the Lord would gather the people once again and bring them from exile to prosperity and peace. And the Lord will raise up new shepherds who will bring righteousness and justice. Whether these would be a new generation of faithful kings for the people of Israel or in our own time new generations of laity and clergy whose ministry of the baptized is the heart of the Church, it is the Lord God who empowers us all. As we prepare for Advent, let us prepare for the coming of Jesus Christ the good shepherd who inspires and guides our own ministries.

#### Psalm 46

We trust in God in the face of calamity – even in the midst of war or natural disaster, the God of hosts is with us. But the Psalmist also reminds us to do our part - that river in Jerusalem after all was an underground conduit built by Hezekiah for water supply during the siege. And so while we should indeed be still and know God's presence with us, we are called to do more than wait passively for whatever life throws at us. And in our work for peace and healing in our world, our country, and our neighborhoods, we still affirm that God is in our midst.

### Colossians I: 11-20

The coming of Jesus the Christ is cause for joyous celebration and sober reflection. As Thomas Merton reminds us, it is a cause for joy to be a member of the human race where God chose to become incarnate. But Paul reminds us that Jesus' sacrifice on the Cross was for our redemption, to reconcile us with God. And indeed we need to be reconciled. For if we think of sin as being set apart from God, this becomes all too common in light of the cares and chances of our everyday lives. But we take comfort in knowing that we have an advocate in Jesus Christ the righteous who is the atonement for us and the whole world when we fall apart from God. So let us prepare for Jesus' coming - with celebration and reflection.

### Luke 23: 33-43

Dying in agony, a criminal recognizes the holy innocence of Jesus. Dying in agony Jesus blesses the faithful confession of a criminal. Dying in agony, Jesus triumphs, his humanity and divinity being the inseparable foundation for his triumphant sacrifice.

Jesus' humanity speaks to his kinship with us and our human frailty, while Jesus' divinity affirms God's love for us despite our human faults. Christ the King, wearing not a crown of jewels but of thorns, not on a throne of gold but on a cross, invites us to his Kingdom. And all we need to do is ask-'remember me when you come into your kingdom.'
