

From the Rector

This is one of my favourite Sundays of the church year. That might sound strange. There's nothing particularly special about it. It doesn't have the drama of the first Sunday of Advent. There are no special vestments, no rose candle, no sentimental ceremonies.

But the curious thing about the Advent lectionary is that it moves backward. The first Sunday of Advent focuses on "last things." We hear about the second coming, and we are cautioned to prepare ourselves for the day when Christ returns. Then as Advent progresses, we move backward to the words of John the Baptist and toward expectation of the coming of Jesus' earthly ministry. Finally, on the last Sunday of Advent, we shift back further in the narrative, as we look toward the birth of the Messiah.

So while I do appreciate the importance of the first Sunday of Advent, it is actually the second Sunday of Advent that captures my heart. Every year, I hear the Old Testament lessons and the hymns, and I weep. I weep with joy at the promise of comfort, forgiveness, and peace for God's people, in spite of their wrongdoing and their suffering.

And don't we all feel we could use that same comfort and peace, in our world today? War still rages in Ukraine. Our indigenous communities continue to suffer, both from physical violence and from the indignity of judgment and discrimination. The climate crisis continues to escalate, leading to poverty and famine in many parts of the world. And on a more personal level, while we are certainly blessed that much of our common life has returned to normal, many of us are still struggling with the lingering effects of so much isolation, and from the customs and relationships that haven't fully returned. The weight of the world's struggles, combined with our own, is a heavy burden to bear.

But the good news is that we can take comfort in the words of the prophets, spoken to our forebears in faith, but spoken also to us, today-- promises that our shortcomings don't define our relationship with God; promises that no matter how much seems lost, we will be restored to joy once more (though perhaps in ways that look different than what we were expecting); promises that God's kingdom will come and bring with it the perfect peace our world so desperately needs. One of my favourite Advent hymns, "Comfort, comfort ye my people," paraphrases one of the prophecies of Isaiah beautifully:

Comfort, comfort ye my people, speak ye peace, thus saith our God; Comfort those who sit in darkness, mourning 'neath their sorrows' load. Speak ye to Jerusalem of the peace that waits for them; Tell her that her sins I cover, and her warfare now is over.

Do you feel the hope? Do you feel the promise? Our sorrows have been many in recent years. But God is with us. God is for us. And God longs to restore us, to set us free from our tears and our mourning and our pain. Even now, with all that seems lost in our world—with all that seems to give us cause for fear and sorrow—God is at work among us. And the Word of God proclaims to us, "Peace. Your sins are covered. Your warfare is over."

May we welcome and embrace the peace of God this season, and always. And may our darkness, our mourning, and our sorrows be no more.
