

Message from the Rector

As we have entered a new season of the church year, a number of elements of our worship will work together to reflect the more solemn, penitential character of Lent. Much of what follows is from a newsletter article this time last year, but I thought it would be useful to share again.

As we marked the transition into the season of Lent, we began last week's service with the Great Litany. It is called the "Great Litany" to distinguish it from the other litanies found in our authorized liturgical materials, such as the litanies we might use at the Prayers of the People, the Litany of Thanksgiving, or the Litany of Penitence we pray at our Ash Wednesday service. The Great Litany is appropriate at any time, but it is most commonly used as the Entrance Rite for the Eucharist to begin the church year on the first Sunday of Advent, and the first (and sometimes fifth) Sunday in Lent, to frame our season of penitence in fervent prayer.

The Great Litany was the first rite to be published in English, prepared by Archbishop Thomas Cranmer in 1544. King Henry VIII ordered its use in all English churches at a time when England was at war with Scotland and France. It was later included as an appendix in the 1549 Book of Common Prayer, and it has been with us ever since. Though some of its petitions may seem archaic to us, it is a beautiful and comprehensive prayer that serves as a connection with our historic Anglican roots and offers a reminder that in all things, we are utterly dependent on God's providence.

As the Great Litany is such a full expression of our prayers and our penitence, when it begins the liturgy, there is no need for the Prayers of the People or for a confession of sin later in the service. This slight change in the order of worship may feel a bit awkward, but that very discomfort is a part of what helps us mark the Lenten season as distinct from others.

You will likely notice some other changes this season, as well. Our vestments and other liturgical hangings are violet, emphasizing penitence. There are no flowers on the altar. Beginning this week and continuing throughout the season, our service will open with the Penitential Order—a format especially suited for Lent, in which the confession comes at the beginning of worship, rather than just before Holy Communion. Throughout the season, instead of a "Gloria" we will sing a "Kyrie"—a song of petition for God's mercy. Likewise, we refrain from the use of "alleluia" and the collective "Glory to God" at the conclusion of the service, reserving the shout of praise and our beloved communal doxology for an even more joyful expression at Easter. Finally, instead of a blessing at the closing to the service, the Celebrant will offer a "solemn prayer over the people." It is appropriate during this prayer to kneel or to bow, as you are able.

Our mass setting for the season is *New Plainsong*, by contemporary composer David Hurd. Dr. Hurd is the retired Professor of Church Music at General Theological Seminary, where I got my Master of Divinity degree, and he currently serves as Organist and Director of Music at St. Mary the Virgin in New York City. This setting's simplicity lends itself particularly well to seasons of penitence and restraint.

As Anglicans, we have a rich liturgical heritage, and a sincere belief that "praying shapes believing." It is my hope that the worship we offer throughout the season of Lent will be authentic, beautiful, and transformative for us all.

Pulling Out All The Stops

On March 4, 2023, Master Musicians from three continents will give the first of its kind, cross continental Pipe Organ performance and education workshops in Africa.

As part of a collaborative effort to bring the pipe organ to places the instrument does not exist, pipe organist (Michael Dirk, UBC and VSO instructor of organ and vice president of Vancouver RCCO) will perform at Vancouver St-John's Shaughnessy (3700 pipes) an arrangement of a Rwandan traditional song (Humura Rwanda) written by Vancouver composer Denis Bédard. This performance will be broadcasted through live streaming to Rwanda providing the accompaniment to a Rwandan choir singing an arrangement of a traditional song called Humura Rwanda.

Where this project gets bold is where a Rwandan music student will be performing specific parts of the song on a digital keyboard to activate and be heard back on the Vancouver pipe organ!

"I cant wait to see the look on their faces when they play the real thing for the first time!" exclaimed Gilles Parenteau, project coordinator and retired Selkirk College music instructor, Nelson BC.

Since there are no pipe organs in Rwanda and considering the sheer size of the instrument, this world premiere will give the opportunity to Rwandan musicians to experience the pipe organ's magnitude and play in real time (across continents) our cherished patrimonial instrument. This will be possible via telemidi technology under the direction of Matt Bray (PhD student Edith Cowan University, Perth, Australia). The telemidi signal (musical instrument digital interface) will be traveling near the earth circumference through over 35,000km of internet links.

The performance is scheduled for March 4th and will be live and available on the internet. (links and info can be found at <u>virtualsymphony.org/rwanda</u>). Six other African countries will be invited to view the performance, with promotion made by SAGE Colleges & Institutes Canada, office located in St-Lucia, Caribbean.

Parenteau and Dominique Soutif (former Juno awarded CBC producer, Ottawa, Ont) are coordinating and producing this new music merging the organ with traditional and original songs from Rwanda. Jacques Murigande (artist name Popo and former Canadian Juno recipient) is the director of the School of Creative Art and Music in Rwanda.

Funding for this project is provided by the Canada Arts Council.
