The 122nd Diocesan Synod of 2023 was held last week. One of the most heated discussions was around the resolution on homelessness and housing affordability. The task force team did a thorough study on this issue for the past 14 months to review how we can understand the problem and how we would engage with the issue. The priorities set by the task force team were 'creating a clear affordable housing vision', 'increase training/skill building/education', 'enhance partnerships and collaboration', 'become visible advocates', and 'provide generous financial support'.


Most of the present delegates were in favor of taking on this project for the upcoming years. We all know Anglican church, at individual, parish, and diocesan levels, has been already putting efforts to relieve the pain and struggle of people on the street and help the marginalized find an affordable housing plan.

Still, not just the downtown east side but the whole province, the country, and the world are struggling with economic polarization and an increasing number of people who are deprived of basic necessary needs. Overwhelmed by the depth and width of the problem, I was rather helpless while seeing this as a problem that would not be solved ever. How can we provide affordable housing for all of them? Would a house solely help them get back to be on their own feet? It always seemed to me something beyond our capacity.

However, on second thought, the eventual goal of this project may not be only changing them, or changing society. It may be more relevant to changing us, and changing the church. We may not be able to provide a house to everyone. However, would it be possible to create a home for all where we consider and care for every one in our neighborhood as a family? We can definitely stand with them, listen to their stories, and find hope together. Furthermore, we will find more hands and voices that have been out there already, once we put ourselves out of our comfort zone. Probably, with the given limits of resources, whatever we do might not solve all problems. However, if we see this as God's way of transforming, we will be able to change our way of seeing and engaging with the world as Christians are called to be. As we help our brothers and sisters find long forgotten hopes and dreams, I am sure we rediscover ours as well.

He entered the University of British Columbia at 15, where he currently studies organ under the mentorship of Professor Michael Dirk. Alongside his pursuit of a BMus, Isaac is Organist at Holy Family Parish in Vancouver; he holds an ARCT in piano and studies harpsichord with Alex Weimann. In 2021, Isaac was division winner of the Vancouver Chamber Choir's Young Composers' Competition. In his spare time, Isaac enjoys building computers and translating Ancient Greek texts.



Postlude from Michael Dirk, Music Director

Though this afternoon will offer a more authentic ascension postlude by Messiaen, to musically acknowledge Ascension I've traditionally offered JS Bach's organ transcription of Vivaldi's 'The Great Moghul' violin concerto RV 208: https://youtu.be/VDdHsK5y_Fo

It's a bit of a music-theory 'pun' as the Allegro movement is in 'ritornello' form (to 'return' - akin to Jesus returning to Heaven) in addition to the opening ascending scales with the 'Hallelujah'-like chords (though Handel wasn't to compose his famed chorus for another 35 years). Its musical merit should be considered quite significant for JS Bach to transcribe it along with two other Vivaldi concertos for organ when he was in his mid-twenties serving as court organist and music director for the Duke of Weimar. Bach would often include crafty divine musical-mathematical references - and I find the end of the piece rather fitting to have 3 statements of ascending scale concluding with a unison finish... as if musically 'tipping the hat' that Jesus ascended, and now home with the Father and Spirit: three in one.

A 'concerto' is a concert work/piece for a soloist and orchestra - this is represented on our organ by the middle keyboards (manual 2 & 3) pipework serving as the orchestra - sounding from the main organ chamber, and the soloist represented on the pipework that protrudes out from the main chamber (lowest keyboard) and the gallery pipework (uppermost keyboard): <https://youtu.be/6I7pN-WinkY>



This piece is of great significance to me as it was the first organ piece I 'fell in love with' and attempted to learn from age 10 onwards. My childhood weekly piano lesson was a bit of a drive from Surrey to the Langley Community Music School. My younger sister and I would be picked up from school for the 30 min drive, have our back-to-back lessons with Carl Montgomery, and if the lessons went 'well', we'd be treated to a drive-through McD ice-cream treat on our way home through Cloverdale, and then over to Public Library. I'm still astonished to this day that they had such a comprehensive organ CD collection

which I could borrow up to 10 at a time... which I maxed out every visit. It was Westminster Abbey organist Simon Preston's Deutsche-Grammophone recording of Bach's 5 organ transcriptions I would ultimately take out week after week, and made a mixed tape of this one movement repeated over and over. I was hooked! The exquisite performance on the 1986 Führer organ of St. Mary's Cathedral, Lübeck, Germany; coupled with a tremendously successful recording balance of both instrument and reverberant acoustic- 23m:34s start Concerto III:

I would suggest it be of Divine providence that Ward Music of Langley would have a Novello collection of Bach's organ transcriptions which would become my very first organ score purchase of a mere \$11 back in 1992. Thankfully my piano teacher was most supportive and had taken organ secondary lessons with St Helen organist Fred Geoghegan during his UBC piano studies (SJS organist Ed Norman would be Fred's successor as UBC organ prof).

I would meet Simon Preston at a concert he gave as part of the 2001 Holy Rosary Cathedral organ re-dedication series. In 2001, Denis Bédard moved from Quebec City to be organist-composer at Holy Rosary and succeed Ed Norman at UBC - as his student learned many of his works. Both prelude and postlude for Pentecost come from his 2003 Fantasie on the Pentecost hymn tune Veni Creator Spiritus (Come Creator Spirit), a 9th century Gregorian chant melody attributed to Frankish Benedictine monk Rabanus Maurus.
