A famous Korean essayist, WanSuh Park, lost her son at his age of 25 by a car accident in 1988, in the same year she lost her husband to cancer. She shared how devastating it was for her. For many Koreans, there is a special, strong attachment between a mother and a son, and losing her son seemed to her a death sentence at that time.

She was a Christian, and upon that incident, God who she believed to be benevolent and merciful had become a recipient of her anger and hatred. She said she cried like a wounded beast every day, as if she had something stuck in her stomach to throw up. She was so mad that God took her son away, and she thought there was no reason for this punishment. "How dare he do this when

He is believed to be the God of Love? If this is all who He is, it is better that He does not exist", she thought.


As she was tormented in everlasting agony, one day, she read something that a young religious sister wrote. This sister had a brother who was causing all troubles and never got better even after he grew up. She resented having a brother like that, and asked herself why her brother, of all people, was a troublemaker. Then it came to her mind that there were so many people who were lost and wandering, and why not that my brother could be one of them. After that, she changed her mind. Who am I to demand what I am entitled to have? As she accepted the reality, interestingly, her relationship with her brother got better, she wrote.

This brought to Park so many thoughts. She kept asking "why" all the time, but "why not"? Why do I deserve to claim only all good things in my life? Why not me? What have others done who lost their sons? What about God Himself watching Jesus dying on the cross? It puzzled her and opened a space for her to find a seed of peace or at least stop being a prisoner of her own anger and hatred. Until then, she kept asking "Lord, only speak a word", a word of apology, or a word to clarify her mind, and God kept silent. But as time went by, she realized that God had been letting her pain and resentment come out into His silence.

Sometimes, we are so entitled. We are not grateful for what we already have received, and we get angry when we do not get more of what we think deserve. That was my first reaction when I read the Gospel passage this Sunday. How could Jesus call Canaanite woman a dog and refuse to help her? How come? He should have helped her as the Lord. But on second thought, why not? What makes us deserve God's blessing? Literally, God does not owe anything to us. I am not doubting the love of God. But at times, we are challenged to look into our anger, frustration, or disappointment in which we think we know better what God's Love should be like. Knowing our limits, and trusting God's unlimited love upon humility, we will be able to free ourselves from whatever has been keeping us from growing love and trust in God.

Pottery hand building workshop

Spirituality in general always includes restoring connection. From my experience of doing pottery over 10 years, pottery in that sense, is not just a craft but also a spiritual practice of being in touch with the soil in a tactile way, being in touch with your body, being in touch with your inner creativity.

The session is offered separate on different dates and will include some reflective sharing about creativity and conversations. Since there is no wheel at the parish, it will be slap building, coiling, or pinching. Due to the limits of space, each session will accommodate a limited number of 4 participants, but there will be more sessions if there is a demand.

The materials and kiln will be offered by Hand Eye Pottery Studio. The fee is for the material and firing fee. It will be decided by the size of the object later, and I speculate approximately IO CAD for the size of cereal bowl.
