

The Feast of St. Bartholomew the Apostle

Today is the feast of St. Bartholomew, the Apostle. We will commemorate him this morning in our Thursday Eucharist, but as I prepared a few words for my homily, I thought perhaps it would be of interest to some who may not be able to attend during the workday. While we have very little information about the details of his life, his legacy has inspired countless Christians throughout the ages.

Background

Bartholomew's name is a patronymic, combining bar ("son of") with the name Tolmai or Ptolemy. It is likely that he had a given name, as well. He is mentioned in the synoptic Gospels (Matthew, Mark, and Luke) as Bartholomew, and is usually linked closely with Philip. In the Gospel of John, however, Philip is paired instead with someone named Nathanael. It is therefore widely assumed that Bartholomew and Nathanael are the same person. We might even call him Nathanael Bartholomew ("Nathanael, Son of Tolmai").

The only story about Nathanael Bartholomew, aside from lists of the twelve, comes from the first chapter of the Gospel of John.

The next day Jesus decided to go to Galilee. He found Philip and said to him, "Follow me." Now Philip was from Bethsaida, the city of Andrew and Peter. Philip found Nathanael and said to him, "We have found him about whom Moses in the law and also the prophets wrote, Jesus son of Joseph from Nazareth." Nathanael said to him, "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?" Philip said to him, "Come and see." When Jesus saw Nathanael coming towards him, he said of him, "Here is truly an Israelite in whom there is no deceit!" Nathanael asked him, "Where did you come to know me?" Jesus answered, "I saw you under the fig tree before Philip called you." Nathanael replied, "Rabbi, you are the Son of God! You are the King of Israel!" Jesus answered, "Do you believe because I told you that I saw you under the fig tree? You will see greater things than these." And he said to him, "Very truly, I tell you, you will see heaven opened and the angels of God ascending and descending upon the Son of Man."

Life and Martyrdom

We have no concrete historical information about Nathanael Bartholomew after his mention in Scripture. However, early writers such as the historian Eusebius of Caesarea tell us that he went to preach in India (though some suggest that the "India" used here actually refers to Ethiopia). He is also said to have taken the Gospel to Armenia. There he is said to have converted the king to Christianity, angering those who feared a Roman backlash.

Stories about his death differ. Some say he was thrown into the sea to drown; others, that he was crucified upside down like St. Peter. But the most

well-known narrative holds that he was skinned alive and then beheaded. For this reason, his emblem in Christian art is the flaying knife. Bartholomew is the patron saint of tanners, plasterers, tailors, leatherworkers, bookbinders, farmers, housepainters, butchers, and glove makers.

BEADING WORKSHOP

Beading has an 8,000 year history among First Nations Peoples. Early trade with Europeans included beads which were used for adornment and

ceremonial items. First Nations People and Metis used these trade beads to adorn clothing and household items. The Metis were called "The Flower Beadwork People" by some First Nations People in response to the beautiful work created by the Metis women.

Led by Kerry Baisley, in this workshop we will be introduced to Metis beading and go on to learn different beading techniques as we create a beaded Orange Shirt pin. We will talk about the Residential School experience of Phyllis Webstad and how Orange Shirt Day came into being. This pin can be worn to remind yourself and others of the Children who attended Indian Residential Schools.

Spirituality in general always includes restoring connection. From my experience of doing pottery over 10 years, pottery in that sense, is not just a craft but also a spiritual practice of being in touch with the soil in a tactile way, being in touch with your body, being in touch with your inner creativity.

The session is offered on two different dates and will include some reflective sharing about creativity and conversations. Since there is no wheel at the parish, it will be slap building, coiling, or pinching. Due to the limits of space, each session will accommodate a limited number of 4 participants, but there will be more sessions if there is a demand.

The materials and kiln will be offered by Hand Eye pottery studio. The fee is for the material and firing fee. It will be decided by the size of the object later, and I speculate approximately IO CAD for the size of cereal bowl.
