

Last week we heard Peter's enthusiastic declaration that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God. This week, however, Jesus enters a new phase of his ministry among his friends, teaching them about the suffering he must endure. And Peter-- the same one who so clearly saw Jesus' identity before—has a hard time accepting that the Messiah must suffer this way. But Jesus tells him that only those who are willing to take up their own cross can be his followers.

In some ways, this Scripture passage is kind of a downer. I mean, "Follow me and suffer," isn't exactly a great marketing campaign. But then again, Jesus isn't selling something. He's simply being honest. When we live as he lived, we will surely experience the pain and heartache that come with loving and not being loved in return; with kindness that goes unappreciated; or with forgiving when we have been deeply hurt. While it may not be a great message for attracting new church members, I find it comforting that our faith is one that names the unpredictability and unpleasantness of this life.

Moreover, I find it comforting that Jesus himself has endured our struggles. And the hard things he did weren't just because bad things happened to him that he couldn't escape, but because he also chose to willingly give up his own needs and wants for the sake of loving and caring for others. In doing so, he sets an example for us, that we, too, can make an offering of ourselves and our lives for the common good.

As we begin a new program year, many of us will return to familiar routines and activities after a summer of "down time." Whether it's back to school, back to work, or back to a busier schedule of church and social activities, we will probably experience some amount of stress or anxiety around these commitments. And much of that stems from the discomfort we experience when we try to live the way of love and self-sacrifice in communities of imperfect people. And although we might rather avoid doing so (wouldn't we all rather care for our own needs first?), Jesus says this is the way to find life that is truly life-- life that is truly eternal.

May this year, in all its unpredictability and all its challenges, bring us closer to Jesus as we strive to follow his example.

BEADING WORKSHOP Saturday, September 23 I:30-4:30pm at St. Philip's AnglicanChurch 3737 W. 27th Avenue Vancouver

Beading has an 8,000 year history among First Nations Peoples. Early trade with Europeans included beads which were used for

adornment and ceremonial items. First Nations People and Metis used these trade beads to adorn clothing and household items. The Metis were called "The Flower Beadwork People" by some First Nations People in response to the beautiful work created by the Metis women.

Led by Kerry Baisley, in this workshop we will be introduced to Metis beading and go on to learn different beading techniques as we create a beaded Orange Shirt pin. We will talk about the Residential School experience of Phyllis Webstad and how Orange Shirt Day came into being. This pin can be worn to remind yourself and others of the Children who attended Indian Residential Schools.

Kerry has been serving as the Missioner for Indigenous Justice for the Anglican Diocese of New Westminster since 2020. Previously Kerry worked in positions ranging from Emergency Child Welfare, a Regional Social Worker in the Yukon, and Medical Social Work in Residential Care. He retired as a Director of Client Relations and Risk Management in Richmond Hospital with Vancouver Coastal Health. He is a past Board Member of the 127 Society for Housing and a member of the Métis Nation of British Columbia.
