


"Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, and being born in human likeness. " - Philippians 2:5-7

This is one of my favourite scripture passages. You'll notice, if you read it in your old-fashioned (non-digital) Bible, and even in many online resources, that the text of these verses and those that follow is set apart like a poem. Scholars believe Paul is quoting a very early Christian hymn which would have already been known to his readers. Considering that the letter to the Philippians was written around the year 61 CE, this is a very early piece of Christian history!

In the decades after Jesus' death and resurrection, believers didn't have their theology neatly organized-- that would take the Church centuries to iron out. They weren't sure what to say about Jesus' divinity and his humanity; they didn't have a theory of the Trinity (though they believed in the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit); and they certainly hadn't wrestled much with how atonement worked (a subject that's still not settled). The Gospel was so fresh, and Jesus' followers still expected this world would end quickly. Why grapple with such things?

But here, we have some insight into their perspective on Jesus' identity and his resurrection. And what do we learn? The way of God demonstrated in Jesus Christ was the way of humility. Jesus willingly gave up the benefits of divinity, and his humility is what leads to his ultimate triumph. Jesus' voluntarily being made low leads to his being lifted high, exalted to the right hand of God, that the rest of us might make ourselves humble before him. It's a beautiful vision of his teaching that the last shall be first, and that greatness is manifest in humility. And we are called to follow Jesus' example, in our own lives, being humble, as he was humble. If Jesus, who had every cause for boasting, made himself low, how much more ought we to subject ourselves to one another's needs and best interests, for the sake of sharing God's love?

If you have family members or close friends who have died in the





The Healing Path: A Memoir and an Invitation A Zoom Event with James Finley, Ph.D. Student of Thomas Merton, contemplative practitioner and Clinical Psychologist



Pottery hand building workshop - spiritual practice of creativity

Spirituality in general always includes restoring connection. From my experience of doing pottery over 10 years, pottery in that sense, is not just a craft but also a spiritual practice of being in touch with the soil in a tactile way, being in touch with your body, being in touch with your inner creativity. The sessions are offered separately on different dates and will include some reflective sharing about creativity and conversations.

Since there is no wheel at the parish, it will be slap building, coiling, or pinching. Due to the limits of space, each session will accommodate a limited number between 2 and 4 participants, and you may inquire other specific dates of your own if you are registering with someone (non-parishioner is welcome as well).

The materials and kiln will be offered by Hand Eye Pottery Studio. To get the final piece, it will take about 2 weeks, and once it is bisque fired, you will get an email to choose which glaze you would like to choose. The fee is for the material and firing fee. It will be decided by the size of the object later, and I speculate approximately 10 CAD for the size of cereal bowl. IIHALLOWEEN SPOOKTACULAR !!



The original organ for St John's, Shaughnessy was an 'organ transplant' from Canton, Ohio's CrossRoads United Church containing 1478 pipes crafted in 1920 by the Estey organ company for their opus 1869. By the early 60s this instrument was due for a significant overhaul, and it was determined more cost effective to replace with new, which also enticed the prospective organist Fred Carter to immigrate from Armagh Ireland to SJS. The \$85k (equivalent to 3 Shaughnessy homes at the time) contract was awarded to the Hallman organ company of Kitchner Ontario.

What was salvageable of the redundant Estey organ was incorporated into a hybrid house

theatre style organ in Victoria. When the 3600 pipes of the Hallman arrived in 1968, it enjoyed the title of being GVRD's largest pipe organ until 2001. In addition to its grand size, it has several novel features: two sets of pipes which sound below audible range (16Hz); 9 sets of pipes sounding antiphonally from the gallery, a horizontal copper state trumpet, a gallery console and movable master console on the chancel. Though having had exceptional care for decades by local technician Marianne Huestis, by its 50th year, it too needed a significant overhaul. Headed up by Music Director Michael Dirk and the exceptional talents of Steve Miller of Calgary, the electronics were updated from analog to digital, and several other enhancements including a few more ranks (oboe, clarinet, flute, and string), chimes, new silent blowers and swell expression motors. Dedicated Oct 28, 1968 by Archbishop Godfrey Gower, the 55th anniversary will be celebrated the night prior on Friday Oct 27, 7:30pm by local members of the Royal Canadian College of Organists Vancouver Centre (for whom Michael Dirk serves as co-president). This free/by-donation recital features local organists dressing up in costume and offering the spookiest and scariest music written for the 'king of instruments' (Bach Toccata & Fugue in d minor, Phantom of the Opera, Böellmann's Suite Gothique etc). Costumes are encouraged, and there are Halloween treats for the kids and the young at heart!
