



## From the Curate

Last Thursday, there was a clergy day gathering and the theme of the study was liturgy. Rev. Richard Leggett and Rev. Rob James gave a wonderful talk and I would like to share some of the contents from the lecture and my own thoughts.

In the lecture, Rev. Richard articulated the nature of worship in the contemporary Anglican tradition. Anglican worship is ecclesial, liturgical, and missional.



It is ecclesial in a sense that it is an act of community, not abstract but concrete, where baptismal assembly gathers to exercise their own gifts and vocation. In worship, we come together to sing praise to God, and reaffirm our identity as Christians. However, this community always exists for the world, not for its own profit since that is the way Jesus Christ is and we are His body.

Anglican worship is liturgical. It is a work that brings the salvation history into the present moment. God's time (Kairos) is expressed into our time (Chronos) in this worship. It is a public work, and the assembly is sanctified in the world and for the world. The structure of worship both unites diverse communities and makes a space for the particular character of those communities.

Anglican worship is missional. During the lecture, it was emphasized that liturgy that is not lived outside is not liturgy. Through the liturgy, we engage in the world trans-culturally (share the same identity), contextually (reflect the world we live), cross-culturally (hold diversity), and counter-culturally (bring a new way of life).

Every Sunday, we gather, we listen to God's words, we offer our prayers for ourselves and for the world, we prepare the gifts and participate in holy communion, and we are sent back to the world as we carry our mission.

As I think of liturgy, an image of a heart comes to my mind. The heart contracts and relaxes to pump blood. Every beat keeps our body alive with blood circulation. Same is our worship.

We gather together to give thanks to God, to reaffirm our identity, and receive blessings from God. We join the table of the Lord, and by receiving and being received, we are united as one body. Then, we go out to the world to expand what we have just experienced. We bring Good News to others, we pray with the afflicted and lonely ones, and we bear blessings for others, and we invite people to our table of life.

What has been begun by our Lord Jesus Christ will be continued by His body, until all will be gathered together at the banquet under the new heaven and on the new earth.

## **Pottery Hand Building Workshop - Spiritual Practice of Creativity**


December 2nd Saturday 2pm | St. John's Shaughnessy Parish | Facilitated by James Hwang

Spirituality in general always includes restoring connection. From my experience of doing pottery over 10 years, pottery in that sense, is not just a craft but also a spiritual practice of being in touch with the soil in a tactile way, being in touch with your body, being in touch with your inner creativity. The session is offered separate on different date and will include some reflective sharing about creativity and conversations.

Since there is no wheel at the parish, it will be slap building, coiling, or pinching. Due to the limits of space, each session will accommodate limited number between 2 and 4 participants, and you may inquire other specific dates of your own if you are registering with someone (non-parishioner is welcome as well).

The materials and kiln will be offered by Hand Eye pottery studio. To get the final piece, it will take about 2 weeks, and once it is bisque fired, you will get an email to choose which glaze you would like to use. The fee is for the material and firing fee. It will be decided by the size of the object later, and I speculate approximately 10 CAD for the size of cereal bowl. Number of participants is limited. Please register at jhwang@sjs.net






