



From the Curate

Sometimes, wise men and women throughout history have posed a simple question to challenge people to look around, look into, or look forward from, where they were when they felt "stuck," like they were spinning a treadmill. One of those questions I often call to mind is "Where are you going?" Where are you going? Where is your life leading you?



Some may already have an answer, while

others may be puzzled. Whether we have the answer at the moment or not, we all know that we do not know where we are going with certainty before the rough waves of life. Uncertainty weakens our souls. As a result, some cease to think and try to ignore big questions. Some focus on more approachable and tangible goals and enjoy the small accomplishments. All are good, but neither of these help us answer to the question, "Where are you going?"

To know where we are going, first we need to know where we are. To know where we are, we need to pause for a moment and look, listen, and feel. Depending on our spiritual tradition, this active effort to be "awake" in the present is called meditation or mindfulness. It is a practice of pulling ourselves away from a busy mind, worries, desires, anger, and other exhausting emotions, and encountering ourselves and the world around us. It is a way of moving away from any reactive responses from inside or any seductive messages from outside, and of being genuine and rooted with apprehension and affection.

It is quite different from pseudo-spiritual practices where people may be dissociated from reality. Rather, every moment experienced and owned by intentional awareness is solidified to form a thought, a step forward, or a voice to our souls.

As we continue to hold our ground firmly, fragmented thoughts form into a vision, continuous steps lead us to a path, voices turn into a message. It sounds quite abstract, but one thing is for sure: in those moments, we will learn the value of our being by paying

attention to it, and be present with it. Furthermore, as Christians, we will also find the being of God in us and our own being in God in those awakened moments.

In this journey, there is no right or wrong answer. There exists only our story that unfolds with God's story. However, if it is not fully lived and owned, our story would be a mere babbling sound without meaning or direction.

As we come closer to the end of Advent, our days may be full of excitement around holiday or numbness around piled-up events and schedules. To avoid being dragged or drifted by external or internal waves, it would be helpful for us to set some time aside during the day or the week, just to be with ourselves, with the world around us, with God who is always there for us. Eventually, love is to be present with, and as we learn how to love, our inner desire and longing for love will tell us where we would like to go.
